



And yet, my mind is not only on the holidays, but on a vision for our Synagogue's future. It is an exciting future and I would like to share this vision with you.

Let me begin by telling you how happy I am to be here. You have all accepted me so graciously and so warmly, that I already feel like the Shul has been my home for years, even though, as of this writing, it has yet to even be a full month! That is why I look forward to sharing so much with you.

The programs I am planning cover a wide range of categories. The adult education will have already started by the time you read this. If you haven't checked out any of the classes, I hope you will.
